

United Food Bank Is On The Move

ve been on the road and on the move this year, more than ever, as we prepare to relocate to temporary facilities and break ground on our new building. Your help is the only way we can make it happen. We are now at the critical halfway mark of our \$5.17 million capital campaign.

United Food Bank and Services of Plant City, Inc. (UFBPC), serving nine local communities in East Hillsborough, relies on you. We rely on strong community partners, including individuals, corporations, and government, to strengthen the lives of those less fortunate than us. We've proven, for more than 30 years in business, that, together, we can and do make a difference.

Yet, to assure the sustainability of our mission, including programs that can offer lasting impact—and to continue to provide a hand up and not a hand out, we are taking the ground-breaking step to construct a new building, one that will be nearly double the cubic square feet of the existing facility.

A rendering of the proposed new building is pictured on the next page, as drafted by Boggs Design Partners' (BDP) Erica Azorin Craig, AI, NCARB, Principal Architect, working in close collaboration with our Building Committee and project manager, Claudio Pastore, from CBRE construction project management firm. With our new building will come an exciting demonstration kitchen for classroom instruction, with on-site—

culturally informed—
cooking, to include
classes for healthy
menu planning and
cooking on a budget.
A covered outdoor
area will be new to us
and will help protect our clients when
coming to pick up emergency food
supplies in bad weather.

The UFBPC building committee recently selected—with full Board approval—the local Dykstra Construction firm (a JF Company) as the general contractor. The decision was made following submission and review of three competitive bids.

We will be closed only for perhaps one week in the middle of October 2023, while we pack and move to our temporary location. Recently, our whole team, including the UFBPC's Building Committee, Darry Dykstra of the newly hired Dykstra Construction firm, and Michelle Miday from Boggs Design Partners, took time to don hard hats and carry shovels to celebrate the start to our demolition and rebuilding at 702 East Alsobrook Street in Plant City—our current location. The new building will be part of the community improvement and business expansion effort within the CRA (Community Reinvestment Act) area, an overall improvement to the local area.

A temporary new location, only during our 6-8 month period of construction, to begin toward the end of October 2023, will be at Hillsborough Community College Plant City, at 2001 E. Cherry Street, an approximate two-mile distance from the current location. Our phone number will remain the same. The services offered during the transition will not change, including client food pickup, classes, Direct Community Outreach (offsite food deliveries), Feeding Our Legacy, Feeding Our Future (kids' bags), the Pet Pantry, and the Diaper Pantry, to name a few programs.

In addition to retracing our progress with the building, I want to welcome back to UFBPC Angelica Lombrana, serving as our Chief Operating Officer. She began working as an intern at UFBPC in 2015, while working on her AA



degree in Counseling and Human Services from Hillsborough Community College. After graduating, she was hired full-time at the food bank in 2016, as an Operations Assistant. By February of 2017, she had become the Operations Manager.

Ms. Lombrana moved in March of 2018 to the East Coast of Florida, although she continued to consult with UFBPC. In February of 2020, she moved back to Tampa and began working as a Program Coordinator for Teaching Tools Resource Center through the Hillsborough Education Foundation, a program supporting mostly Title I schools in the local district. In June 2022, she accepted a promotion as a Southeast Community Engagement Manager for the tech company *findhelp*, by advancing its interactive, social service resource platform, working with school districts, hospitals, nonprofits, and government entities.

Back now at UFBPC, she is managing day-to-day operations, supervising staff, overseeing programs, and supporting me and this organization with the long-term goals of the agency. She has said she always envisioned herself back here. She knows that UFBPC is where her heart is. Just glad to have her back and leading our team.



In addition to the twelve existing partnerships with local schools, these schools were added in 2022-23: Mann Middle School, Bryan Elementary School, and Simmons Career Center.

Goals for Food Program

2023 marked the 10th Anniversary of Goals For Food, a partnership between Mosaic, the Tampa Bay Lightning, and

area food banks. The program has provided 9.8 million meals, with over \$800,000 raised in the past 10 years. Mosaic donates \$1,000 for every goal and \$1,500 for every hat trick scored by a Lightning player during home games. For the 2022-23 season,

Mosaic donated \$173,500, distributed across 12 food banks. UFBPC received \$14,500, working with Christopher Johnson, Mosaic's Senior Social Responsibility Specialist.

Mary Mike Herold Pet Pantry

Dr. Arthur Herold was the first to commit to a naming opportunity in the new United Food Bank building: a pet pantry in honor of his late mother, Mary Mike Herold, who passed away in February of 2003. She was born in Cairo, GA,



and moved to Plant City at sixth months of age. Mary and the late Mr. William W. (Bill) Herold, Jr., were married in 1950, and raised five children who all attended Plant City High School. She was well known for her love of cats and



dogs, as once featured in the Plant City Courier. They both gave back to this community, with Mr. Herold named 1999 Outstanding Citizen of the Year by the Civic Clubs of Plant City, Florida, for Lifetime Service. The

pantry will continue his mother's commitment to animal welfare by supporting pet owners experiencing hard times.

HCSO Fishing Tournament

Through the generosity of Hillsborough County Sheriff Chad Chronister's Office (HCSO), UFBPC was awarded a \$25,000 donation, raised through its annual fishing tournament. The June



2, 2023, "Hook, Line, and Sinker" event was held at the Westshore Yacht Club, with TAMCO (Thompson Architectural Metals Company) serving as Title Sponsor.

Outreach Services: Financial and health classes such as Money Smart, Health Literacy, Diabetes Prevention, Couponing, Cooking on a Budget, and Growing Sustainability; seasonal flu shots; GED Prep Program Referrals; ACCESS Site for DCF benefits; veterans' support; job search and placement; direct community outreach to low-income areas

In-House Work Experience Internships: Hillsborough Education Foundation with Bank of America, Take Stock in Children, Hillsborough Community College clinical program, and Career Source Plant City High School Exceptional Student Education Transition Program

Partnerships: Hillsborough Community College, Hillsborough County Public Schools, Florida Department of Health, Hispanic Services Council, Florida Blue, BayCare's South Florida Baptist Hospital, Feeding Tampa Bay, FEMA, TD Bank, grocery stores, private donors, foundations, and corporations

UFBPC Board Chair's Report

e've come so far on the new building capital campaign. If not for all of you, individuals and companies alike, we would not be looking at the home stretch for a new United Food Bank and Services of Plant City (UFBPC) building.

Even with initial gifts, we have much more work to do to reach our financial goal of \$5.17 million for the building. I have strong faith that we will get there. Given the continued community support—many of you I know personally—and given our executive leadership, with Mary Heysek at the helm, and the strength of our Board of Directors, each and every member, and with the Building Committee taking a lead role, we are halfway to our goal.

I'm honored and humbled to be asked to serve a second term as Board Chairman. The thought, voted unanimously by the Board of Directors, was to maintain the continuity of leadership to see us through the capital campaign. As Bill McDaniel, Vice Chairman of the Board stated, "You don't change generals in the middle of a battle."

With the decision to have Dykstra Construction serve as the general contractor, out of three bids submitted, we have added more strength to our existing team. Darry Dykstra and his firm will now work alongside of CBRE Project Management and Boggs Design Partners (architect and interior designer) to achieve cost efficiencies and quality in all phases of construction.



We appreciate the use of Hillsborough Community College (HCC), and Dr. Marty Clay, for working with us on temporary facility space, while our current location is demolished and rebuilt. Demolition is planned toward the end of October, with the move into our new building, at the same Alsobrook location, by second quarter of 2024.

We're at this milestone because of dedicated volunteers who provide 2,500 hours of time per month serving others, something I believe we are put on this earth to do. We serve clients from hardworking families, in nine surrounding communities, unable to make ends meet. It breaks my heart to see them struggle, when a hand-up from UFBPC could make all the difference. If you haven't helped already, I hope you'll join our efforts to be part of the solution. Contact me or Mary Heysek for giving opportunities to make the new building a reality.
